



#### Timely Tips - February

February can be either a busy month or a slow month, depending on what you grow and where you grow it. Structural work can be done on most trees during this time, though take extra precautions in sealing wounds, avoid making major bends and make sure that trees are going back into protected storage situations. If your dormant storage is outdoors, then avoid heavy work that can stress branches - tiny fractures can dry out internal tissues and cause major damage when the tree is least able to recover.

Work on tropicals will depend on your circumstances. If you support the trees with extra light & humidity, then wiring and some hard pruning can be done. If the tree is simply in a window, don't do much, as the stress can cause branch die-back. Lightly fertilize every couple of weeks, but don't push too much food. Also allow some drying between waterings. This helps align the tree with what would be the 'dry season' dormancy period it would experience in nature. The goal is to keep trees stable over the winter and not encourage rampant growth which will be leggy and weak.

Monitoring moisture levels is going to be the challenge this time of year; it's going to depend on how protected your storage is and how much organic material is in your soil mix. Its very easy to over-water new stock that still in nursery soil. Other trees are going to vary by the ambient temperature.

Otherwise, it's a good time to clean and sharpen tools, check out the upcoming shows, catch up on books or other learning opportunities. For those who have extra time plans can be made for repotting season - choosing pots for trees, making sure soil components are on hand, etc.

## The Greenhouse- Winter Silhouette Exhibit

We have been very fortunate to land an incredible venue for our first Winter Silhouette and Flowering Tree Show. This is a one day exhibition on Saturday March 25, 2023. Set up is at 9 am and the Exhibit will end between 3:30 and 4:00 pm. The Greenhouse is a plant-themed drinks bar and gathering place just south and east of downtown Iowa City and, if you are familiar with the area, across the street from New Pioneer Co-op. This is a large, comfortable L-shaped establishment, filled with plants. The outside walls are entirely glass. This is an order-in or bring your own food establishment. We will have the short end of the L for the Exhibit. If the weather is suitable, there are also outdoor patios where we can set up displays. All IBA and EIBA Members are welcome to exhibit trees. As this is a winter silhouette and flowering tree exhibit, I would like to keep the displays to deciduous and flowering trees. However, if you have a conifer that you would like to bring and think would be appropriate to the occasion, I'm open to that. Table coverings will be supplied, but members should bring labels providing information about their trees and other display accessories, if desired. There will be no pipe and drape. Noah Butler, Susan Daufeldt, Harvey Ireland and Jared Wall were privileged to work with Jennifer Price in November of 2022. Cat Nelson dropped in for a while and a good time was had by all. Members of the study group discussed design issues, pruned, wired and carved trees. Susan was

especially grateful for help with wiring techniques. She feels she still has a long way to go, but definitely has more clarity on how to approach the problems of wiring. Jennifer explained the difference between the wiring technique practiced by Mauro Stemberger and the techniques

practiced by Ryan Neil. Jennifer has learned both techniques from Mauro and Ryan, respectively. Subsequently, Susan has found it easier to make decisions in the course of wiring out some challenging trees.

Harvey came away with a better understanding of the annual fall work and the decision making that has to be done as we reduce foliage going into dormancy and establish design. Harvey brought a number of collected elms to the workstudy group. The forest clump pictured on this page was collected exactly as it was growing in nature. The task then was to determine what should stay and what should go. But first, The Front.... A spirited and interesting discussion ensued!

Noah Butler wrote, "My biggest take-away from our fall workshop with Jennifer centered on my new appreciation for the importance of studying deciduous structure after leaf drop. Specifically, focusing on using the opportunity to see and deeply examine the trees without leaves each fall, and taking full advantage of this opportunity to guide approaches to fall pruning and planning future development. After our conversations and study of my trees, Jennifer made it much easier for me to see where I should consider restraining/ reducing specific areas, while planning to let other areas continue to elongate and grow vigorously, with overall balance of energy in mind."


Looking back, Jared Wall said that, first, he learned that his wiring skills weren't quite what he'd believed they were, especially when it came to working with heavier gage wire. He felt that Jennifer offered some tips and techniques that will really help him in the future. He says, "I came to our workshop wanting to style a tree in a wind swept style and Jennifer and I took that tree to a level beyond my expectations...."

We're all looking forward to this year's work and the opportunity to continue to develop our eye and our skills.





Absolutely whenever the weather and circumstances permit, it is time to go out and look at the bones of the trees. Whether you do it from your car or on foot, don't miss the beauty of dormant trees.

On Thanksgiving Day, 2022, my travels took me through three Only three counties. counties. But I was hours late arriving at my destination because I was driving back roads and photographing trees. In Tiffin, Iowa (Johnson County) there is this grouping of four very old oak They are an incredible trees. bonsai study. Two of them are pictured here. In the far shot, below, you can see the relationship of these two trees the larger stretching, reaching, and the smaller tree literally stooping below it. The smaller tree also has an incredible deadwood feature (See detail, right) and is clearly at least partially hollow.









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
An old Sycamore on the Sutliff Road, Linn County, Iowa.

Right, a star moss on Thanksgiving Day, Johnson County, Iowa. Star moss Does grow in Iowa, but it requires a bit of looking and it is very hard to keep this one alive here in container culture.

Below Right, bare branches on a mature oak, Johnson County, Iowa. Note the small branches that grow out all along the heavy branches. This is interesting, as these are branches that ought to be shaded out by overhead exterior foliage, but are not.

Below Left, an incredible old tree in the middle of Buffaloville (Neal Smith National Wildlife Refuge, Jasper County, Iowa). 1 think this HAS to be an elm, but couldn't get anywhere near it (Because of the Buffalo....There's this BIG fence....).
