It's almost March, buds are swelling and a bit of green is showing on the cherries and crab apples. It's time to repot!


Spring shows are coming up fast. Both clubs have had their first meetings.

The Eastern Iowa Bonsai Association participated in the 2023 Winter Gardening Fair sponsored by the Linn County Master Gardeners. The event was held on February 18th at the Kirkwood Linn County Regional Center in Hiawatha. The EIBA had display tables in the hallway with trees, brochures, soil samples, wire, and magazines. Attendance that day was great. There was a total of 475 people registered for classes. EIBA President John Clemens gave a class entitled "Bonsai - I Want One, Now What?" This class was a sell out. John had 30 interested bonsai people in attendance. There were many questions and lots of interest. Many of the participants visited our display tables after the class. Overall, the day was fantastic for the EIBA and the Master Gardeners of Linn County.

On February 28th, the EIBA held a two hour session of collecting dues and soil distribution at Pierson's Greenhouse on Ellis Blvd in Cedar Rapids. Current and prospective members had the opportunity to stop by, pay dues, pickup their 5 gallon bucket of soil, and visit with our board and other members. We had a good turnout and, so far, we have 15 paid members with 6 unable to attend, who said they will pay next month. We also discussed the yearly program and possible workshops that we are planning for the year. So far, we will be having a workday at Guthridge Park in Hiawatha in July. Members can bring their trees and we will help them with design and the mid-summer work that should be done. We will be having a workshop with Dave Kreutz on azaleas sometime this summer. It was a good day for EIBA.





Timely Tips - March

It's repotting season. It's also styling season. But internodes and large leaves. not, if you please, at the same time! If you have trees in indoor winter storage, you should be watching for the buds on deciduous trees to start turning green. When the buds are green, it is time I'll be repotting a crab apple this afternoon and Fuji cherries tomorrow. Thankfully, it will be many weeks yet before trees in outdoor storage are ready for work. When trees begin to push in the spring and before bud-break, you can also do some light pruning if you didn't get to it in November. You may want to have some rooting hormone on hand so that you can take some cuttings. Andy Smith says that this is the best time for styling conifers.

As temperatures warm up, the trees are not the only ones waking up. Early spray for insects should be done before buds break.

As trees come out of dormancy and begin to grow, their water uptake increases. Be sure to pay attention to the changes and increase your watering accordingly.

Remember, once trees leaf out, they need as much light as possible, otherwise they will develop long

In addition, trees that have leafed should not be exposed to freezing temperatures and, if you have repotted, they need to be kept out of the wind and should not be let to freeze even if they have not yet broken.

Pines and junipers can benefit from getting outside in the sun as soon as temperatures are above freezing, but should come back in if night time temperatures drop below freezing. If you are new to the Art, don't hesitate to seek help from experienced club members. That's what we are here for!








