

Timely Tips - March

It's repotting season. It's also styling season. But not, if you please, at the same time! If you have trees in indoor winter storage, you should be watching for the buds on deciduous trees to start turning green. When the buds are green, it is time to repot. We've had an incredibly mild winter (with the exception of about 10 days in January and 4 in October, now a distant memory). Many trees in indoor winter storage are way ahead of schedule. Crab apples are breaking and Fuji cherries are in bloom. That's 3-4 weeks ahead of schedule. When trees begin to push in the spring and before bud-break, you can also do some light pruning if you didn't get to it in November. You may want to have some rooting hormone on hand so that you can take some cuttings. Andy Smith says that this is the best time for styling conifers.

As temperatures warm up, the trees are not the only ones waking up. Early spray for insects should be done before buds break. I sprayed the entirety of my indoor storage areas yesterday because I saw a small, black flying insect. It was the first thing I've seen moving this year. Clearly time to spray.



As trees come out of dormancy and begin to grow, water uptake increases. Be sure to pay attention to the changes and increase your watering accordingly. I have trees and accent plants that did not go dormant in indoor winter storage this year and they are looking a little pale. I have light, but it was clear to me that those plants needed fertilizing. We don't usually do that this time of year, but it may be advisable and/ or necessary under the circumstances.

Remember, once trees leaf out, they need as much light as possible, otherwise they will develop long internodes and large leaves. Trees that have leafed should not be exposed to freezing temperatures and, if you have repotted, they need to be kept out of the wind and should not be let to freeze even if they have not yet broken.

Pines and junipers can benefit from getting outside in the sun as soon as temperatures are above freezing, but should come back in if night time temperatures drop below freezing. My spruce and pine have been in and out all winter and crab apples and apples have had to go in and out these last couple of weeks. If you are new to the Art, don't hesitate to seek help from experienced club members. That's what we are here for!





Gnarly Branches, Ancient Trees by Will Hiltz








